IMPORTANT TAX NOTICE

December 12, 2025

Effective January 1, 2026 the municipal income tax rate for the Village of Lockbourne will be 2.50%.

All municipal income tax withheld for the Village of Lockbourne must be at the rate of 2.50%.

The credit factor (tax credit) for residence tax purposes is 100.00%. The credit rate (credit limit) shall not exceed 1.50%.

7. All side streets ending with the alleys

If roads are icy, salt will be applied foregoing the 2-inch minimum requirement.


If there is a level 2 or 3 level snow emergency, all vehicles must be removed from the road, or face towing.





DOG SAFETY TIPS

Dog Poop

Did you know that there are 391,000 dogs in Franklin County that produce 147 tons of dog poop per day? During rain events, dog poop can contribute to algal growth in our waterways, depleting oxygen for fish and other aquatic life.

The Pickup Poop (PUP) campaign encourages residents to clean up after their pets to protect our waterways and promote a healthy community. **Remember, PUPing is the law:**

Doggy Doo's and Don'ts:

Doo: Pick up after your dog and use a bag!

Don't: Leave the bag on the ground. Dispose of it in a waste receptacle.

Doo: Take the PUP Pledge. [PUP - Franklin Soil and Water Conservation District](#)

Don't: Forget your bags when you take your dog on a walk! Receive a packet of doggy bags when you sign the PUP pledge.

Dog poop also contains bacteria and other organisms like worms that end up in the environment and can spread through water to other animals or humans, causing a negative impact on both environmental and public health.

What should I do with my doggy doo? Pick it up!! Use a bag or a poop scooper and throw your waste in the trash. Not only is it environmentally healthy, but it is the courteous thing to do. Using an in-ground waste composter that uses micro-organism tablets to break down the poo.

It is better to bag waste, or leave it on the lawn? It is better to bag your waste! It will still end up in a landfill, but the overall negative impact is lessened as fewer bacteria are left in the environment.

Isn't poop good lawn fertilizer? No, not all poop is good lawn fertilizer.

Are there other options other than disposing of pet waste in the trash? You can install in-ground pet waste composters, flush the Waste down the toilet, or hire a pet waste pick up service that has new uses for pet waste such as a source for energy.

Dogs Running Loose

Confining your Dog - Ohio Revised Code Section 955.22C - Ohio law states that all dogs regardless of age must be kept confined on the premises of the owner, keeper or harbored at all times. Acceptable methods of confinement include a fence, a tethering device, a dog pen, inside a house or garage, or under adequate supervision. If you are walking your dog off of your property, you must maintain reasonable control over your dog so that it doesn't run away (the best way to do this is to keep the dog on a leash). The maximum penalties for violations of this section are a \$150 fine on the first offense, and a \$250 fine and 30 days imprisonment for subsequent offenses. If your dog is designated a dangerous or vicious do, see dangerous do law for additional confinement requirements.

Rabies Immunization

Immunizing Your Dog Against Rabies - Ohio Revised Code Section 955.39 - All dogs in Franklin County over three months of age must be currently immunized against rabies by a licensed Veterinarian. This is a requirement of the Franklin County Boards of Health. The maximum penalty for a violation of this section is a \$150 fine, and a \$250 fine and 30 days imprisonment for subsequent offences.

"Goodwill Columbus is a great, long-term partner for us in the work to extend the life of the landfill by diverting waste through reuse, recycling, and repurposing."

He was a former employee of the City of Portsmouth Water Dept. and attended Shawnee Hills Baptist Church and Rivers of Joy Baptist Church. Mike was a US Army veteran.

He is survived by one step-daughter, Theresa (Kevin) Duckson; three step-sons, Robbie Heising, Jimmy Whitt, Troy (Sherrie) Whitt; 12 grandchildren; 15 great grandchildren; one sister, Mary Meyers, and one brother, Paul Coe. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his wife, Judith E. Coe on September 27, 2011; two brothers, Joe Coe, Rusty Coe; two sisters, Lilly Allen, and Nancy Diles, and two nephews, Paul Coe, Jr. and Charles "Chipper" Allen.

ENCOUNTER WITH UFO

The first encounter with a UFO came on January 7, 1948. The flight control tower saw something about the size of a C-47 moving at more than 500 miles per hour. It moved up and down, appearing to have even touched the ground once. The object was said to be glowing. It was visible for twenty minutes until it faded and lowered out of sight. Only two hours earlier in Kentucky, there had been a similar sighting. A pilot tried to pursue it but crashed in the attempt. Popular theory said it was a secret Air Force missile, but nothing was ever confirmed.

In 1965, there was a second encounter with a large glowing object. December 9th, sundown. An unidentified flying object supposedly crashed outside of Kecksburg, Pennsylvania. Witnesses said there was blue smoke from the crash. Army and Air Force were on the scene quickly, and a purportedly acorn shaped object covered with a tarp and loaded into a truck, destined for Lockbourne Air Force Base.

Not long after that, the truck supposedly left for Wright-Patterson Air Force Base near Dayton. Nothing has ever been confirmed about this object, though some people theorize that it was of Soviet origin, while others think it was extraterrestrial. Still others think it was nothing more than a story, the result of rumors.
